A handful of brave and talented EGGS students took to the library floor giving voice to their unique stories with eloquence and verve.

The Suffrage Showcase was the inspiration of Year 13 Learning Egg Prefect Jesslyn Woo. After entering the Kate Edgar Charitable Trust competition with her beautiful song about what NZ women's suffrage means



to her today, Jesslyn asked if she and a few friends could use the library space to showcase more creative expression around this theme.

In September the library had been set up with a number of large interactive 'Suffrage 125' displays – the bright idea of Library Committee leaders, Sylvia Orr and Shonnia Logeswaran. INSPIRING FUTURE SILVER FERNS

In October, EGGS teacher **Eloise Blackwell** was recognised as one of the top 40 most outstanding young graduates at the University of Auckland, which recognises alumni making a significant contribution to their field and community, drawn from a wide range of categories. She was one of three Maori to receive the award. Given the university graduates some 10,000 students each year making the list is a significant achievement.

Eloise, (Ngāti Whātua and Ngāti Wai), graduated with a Bachelor of Physical Education in 2013 and teaches Physical Education and Health at Epsom Girls Grammar. She is also a Black Fern.



Eloise found it somewhat of a shock to be recognised in this way – she considers herself as a teacher who plays rugby part-time. The reality is that it's a full-on schedule for this talented woman who manages teaching whilst also playing professional rugby – with great success.

She is happy that being a teacher allows her to inspire the next generation of sportswomen to wear the silver fern. Young girls are always asking her about her rugby and sharing their dreams. Eloise says that because of the changes and benefits that women are now getting in terms of pay equity and recognition at the elite level, it's very cool that so many girls are aspiring to play the game she loves.

Take some risk, laugh loudly and make some mistakes, because there isn't, nor should there be, such a thing as the perfect run.

No matter what you choose to do from here, just do it like you mean it; laugh, and live your life with purpose. The rest will follow. I am so excited to imagine the adventures that lie ahead for you."

MANUKA POD OPENING - Update from Kirsty Cooper, EGGS Old Girl, OGA

On Friday 9th November we had the pleasure of opening the Manuka Pod officially. This is the culmination of an extensive project which not only included the construction but also the financial sourcing, planning schedules and resource consenting.

The Manuka Pod is the second Pod constructed for Epsom House in the last two years.

We have come a long way from when the School considered the closing of Epsom House due to the extensive costs of upgrading the buildings. Fortunately for the current families, the families back then devised an idea to contribute a 'development levy' in addition to the usual boarding fees. Many of those original families' daughters didn't get to enjoy Pod living as it took many years for the entire amount to be raised from the levy. We are grateful for their foresight and generosity to get the project underway.

The first pod is Pohutukawa and the second Pod, Manuka, was able to be built in quick succession as the Epsom Girls BOT approved the idea to finance the construction up front. The current development levies contribute to the repayment of this finance. Manuka is a pretty close copy of Pohutukawa, with a few tweaks and small improvements from the original design.

Thanks to Anna Logan (an EH Old Girl) who was pivotal in the design of these building. Kane and his team led a well-run project, which included 'neighbour management', to produce a fantastic building. From the rose gold accents to the large kitchen spaces, every detail has been considered and decided upon, based on the best living experience for the girls.



FOCUS ON OLD GIRLS

THE PAST MEETS THE FUTURE: A Photographic Journey Annemarie Hope-Cross (EGGS 1982-1986)

Annemarie has always had a love of the arts, especially photography, but it wasn't a subject option when she was at EGGS, so she took Art and Art History. Praising her teachers, she acknowledges that taking these subjects gave her a lifelong appreciation of art, especially Matisse's work. She also enjoyed music and learnt the clarinet growing up, playing in bands and orchestras whilst at school. Music has become increasingly important to Annemarie, but photography was always her first love.



When she left school, Annemarie worked in a portrait studio for a year but realised that wasn't for her and went to study at Whitecliffe College of Arts and Design. After this she worked in an advertising agency in Parnell; although she was involved in the photographic side of things, it just wasn't the right fit for her. Alas, the passion wasn't gelling into something practical she could embrace.

Diverting away from an artistic career, she joined the Ambulance service as an officer and loved this occupation. When her dad died young and her marriage ended, it was time to reassess her life. Having enjoyed heading down from Auckland to help out with Warbirds Over Wanaka, she found herself enamoured with the thought of living in a small community so, when she spotted an advert on the St Johns' website for a position in Central Otago, she applied. She was accepted and in 2008 made the big move south to Alexandra. People wondered whether she had gone mad, but she absolutely loved the area and, after riding through a few challenges, she settled into her new life with a high measure of enjoyment.

Adding a "meant to be" element to the move, Annemarie met her now-husband, Eric, (also an ambulance officer) on her first day on the job in Alexandra. As well as an obvious attraction to each other, they shared a mutual passion for photography and joined a collective group in Cromwell. Through this, they met other artists, and Annemarie's artistic side was fuelled with ideas, enthusiasm and like-minded camaraderie.

A Lightbulb Moment ...

Flicking through some brochures her late dad had accumulated, she learnt about Lacock Abbey in Wiltshire, England, where photography was invented. (Some scenes in the Harry Potter series were also filmed there). Feeling highly inspired, she made a bold plan and, in 2011, with some funding from a small scholarship, she headed over to do a photography workshop in the small village of Lacock. She experimented with "camera-less photography", focussing on botanical images. This was a light bulb moment in her life and kick-started her journey towards practising as a photographic artist.

In 2013 Annemarie was invited back to Lacock to undertake a residency and further enhance her skills. The contemplative nature and surprising results of her work kept driving her to experiment further and stretch herself using the special techniques she was perfecting.

During her stint in Lacock she produced the second largest body of photogenic drawings in the world, the largest being by William Henry Fox Talbot who lived at the Abbey and invented the process back in 1839. The techniques he developed – and which Annemarie still uses – led to photography as we know it today. Digital photography has enabled a whole new photographic realm these days, but Annemarie prefers the tactile methods and outdoor time involved in producing her outstanding imagery.

In 2017 Annemarie had an exhibition of her work at the Fox Talbot Museum in Lacock. She also participates in group exhibitions at Hullabaloo Artspace in the Cromwell Heritage Precinct and holds solo shows there.

A Setback ...

On 10th August 2017, Annemarie was advised of a diagnosis of a Grade 3 invasive ductal triple negative metastatic breast cancer. Needless to say, this turned her and Eric's life upside-down. She underwent early surgery, six months of chemo, a mastectomy and axillary lymph node clearance, as well as five weeks of radiation in Christchurch. A year after diagnosis she began another six months of chemo.

Annemarie is keen to share her breast cancer story and urges women to be proactive; she recommends asking for a scan as well as mammogram as her type of cancer was only detected from an ultrasound scan. The following is an extract from her Facebook page:

"My message is this; 1 out of 9 women in NZ get this disease. There should not be a stigma surrounding it; we didn't ask for this and it's nothing to be ashamed of. I've also been amazed how many [often young] women I have since heard of who've had breast cancer; we can support each other if we talk. Be vigilant – it may not be a pea (mine was a ridge, at 12 o'clock towards the chest wall) and it may not show on a mammogram (mine didn't, twice).

I am going to beat this thing and be the better for it ... already I've enjoyed a tiny bit of cross-country skiing, and the photography continues."

Annemarie is still recovering and has been learning the benefit of slowing down, of being still, and this has led to a solo show of images she has made over the past year. During time spent lying on her bed recovering, looking out at the garden and dreaming up new photographic ideas has kept her going through the darker days.

The Techniques, Images and Healing

Annemarie works with historic processes and we showcase some of her remarkable images which evoke another era. These first two works are from Annemarie's solo exhibition "Still" at Hullbaloo Artspace. They are, in part, a reflection of her breast cancer journey.






"There are occasions in life when one needs to be still. During such a time in my own life, I have had the opportunity for much contemplation. Many memories have come to mind, often sparked by precious objects such as bottles of photographic chemicals from my grandfather, or a bottle of perfume my father gave my mother. Bottles are receptacles for many things; healing herbs and medicines, darkroom chemicals, perfumes, nourishing creams, foods and wine. To me they speak of memories and are, perhaps, allegories for life itself. Made with a "mousetrap" camera in our garden and using a technique 180 years old, these photographs necessitated still-ness in the making; each exposure required up to 8 hours in autumn sunshine. In the stillness, I have found healing and wellbeing." – Annemarie

These beautiful images below are cyanotypes – a photographic process invented in 1842 and made famous by a biologist named Anna Atkins, who produced the first photographic book on her seaweed series. The Wildflower series is inspired by the wildflower meadows of England, whilst the Penseroso image reflects Annemarie's love of music.

Looking back to move forward

It wasn't until Annemarie delved back into the history and original techniques of her passion that she found her true "sweet spot" which, in turn, enabled her to revitalise her artistic side later in life. Now, happy and productive in Central Otago, and overcoming her health woes, she can confidently call herself a "photographic artist". Whilst she considers herself a "doing" person, the cancer has forced her to spend more time in the "being" space, which she finds a bit of a challenge but is always good for the creative soul.

Annemarie, we wish you all the best for future exhibitions and send healing thoughts for your journey to full recovery, so that you can be fully active again soon.

MINI PROFILES

Belinda Sellars – newly appointed Queens Counsel

Belinda Sellars was at EGGS 1985-1988 and won the 6th Form Art History Prize in 1988. She is a senior criminal lawyer based in Auckland, with more than 20 years litigation experience. Belinda has been a practising barrister sole since 2009; she works within Freyberg Chambers and has successfully defended numerous clients across the full spectrum of offences. Belinda graduated with a BA (1994) and LLB (Hons) in 1995. In 2004 she joined the Public Defence Service and was an original member of the Public Defence Service pilot in the Auckland office. She joined the independent bar in 2009, specialising in criminal law. Belinda was admitted to the Bar in Samoa in 2012. Congratulations Belinda on being appointed QC in November 2018.





Professor Cynthia (Cindy) Farquhar (nee Gunn) CNZM, MBChB, FRCOG, DipObMedGyn, MD, FRANZCOG, CREI, MPH

Cindy attended EGGS 1972-1974 and is a highly respected academic and fertility specialist. She is the Postgraduate Professor of Obstetrics and Gynaecology at the University of Auckland and a consultant clinician. She trained in medicine in Auckland and completed her speciality ob/gyn training in the UK. Cindy has worked in London and the USA and has been involved in many fields including endocrinology and infertility. She operates in both public and private hospitals and has had many peer reviewed publications and technical reports published throughout the years. Cindy has led many clinical trials and has held positions on various medical boards and committees and steering groups.

She is currently the lead methodologist for the WHO Fertility Guidelines in 2018-2019. We're pleased to learn that Cindy has recently been awarded the Liley Medal Award from the Health Research Council of NZ (HRC) for research that has produced a significant breakthrough within the health and medical fields. Cindy was honoured for her study into Intrauterine Insemination (IUI) which was published in The Lancet last November. Jude Dobson (nee Kirk)

Jude (EGGS 1980-1983) has produced and directed an online documentary to mark 100 years since the Liberation of Le Quesnoy. This small French town provides a significant piece of World War 1 history for our country; the New Zealand Division, on their own, liberated this occupied town without any loss of life to the French civilian population, and they did so in a very unusual manner, just a week before the end of the war. This was a very personal project for Jude, with a connection via Auckland Grammar School.

Val (EGGS 1953-1955) is a long-time member of the Mangere Historical Society and has spent the last few years writing about the Walmsley Road area of Mangere, its people and its past. Favona: Its History and Stories is out now – it took three years to finish and includes stories about the Death family, families in Hall Avenue, Robertson Road, through to Norana Ave and surrounding areas. Favona is an area of land between the surrounding Tararata and Harania Creeks, to the east of the Mangere Bridge on the south side of Manukau Harbour; a part of Mangere that is often overlooked.

Louise was profiled on TVNZ's Sunday programme on 15th November – called "From Wheelchair to Walking" it focussed on Louise's ground-breaking research that could change the lives of millions.

Louise has poured her energy into researching a cure for spinal cord injury and now serves on the board of The CatWalk Trust. She recently completed her first half-marathon as part of Team CatWalk, whose motto was "Running so others can walk". Passionate about getting people out of wheelchairs and back on their feet, Louise is a truly inspirational woman, especially given this professor of neuroscience lives with an inoperable brain tumour.

Louise received an EGGS Founders Award in 2015 for Biomedical Research and is a very special Old Girl indeed. We wish you well Louise.

Jan Beagle - A Key Player at the UN (EGGS 1964-1967)

After finishing her high school years at EGGS, Jan completed a Masters degree with first class Honours in History and International Relations from the University of Auckland. Since then, she has forged an impressive diplomatic career, initially working for the NZ Ministry of Foreign Affairs during which time she spent five years as a delegate to the United Nations in New York.

She joined the UN in 1979 in the Department of Political and Security Council Affairs and since that time has held a variety of key senior positions within the UN Secretariat. She has more than 40 years of experience in the political, development and inter-agency work of the organisation, specialising in human rights, disarmament and social development.

On 1st June 2017 Jan was appointed by UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres to the po-

sition of United Nations Under-Secretary-General for Management. Prior to this, she was Deputy Executive Director of the Joint UN Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) and before that was Deputy Director-General of the UN Office in Geneva (2008-209). From 2005-2007 she was Assistant Secretary-General for Human Resources Management at the UN.

In her new role – one of the most senior roles within the UN – Jan leads the overarching management functions of the UN's Secretariat.

This year, Jan received a Distinguished Alumni Award from the University of Auckland where she says she was inspired by some wonderful professors and made lifelong friends.

Jan is a committed advocate for gender equity and was one of the early appointed International Gender Champions – a global leadership network that works to promote gender equality and empowerment of women and girls.

Now based in New York, Jan is married with three daughters and one granddaughter. Her work is high profile but family is important, and she visits New Zealand regularly to see her mother.

Dr Jane Skeen (EGGS 1964-1968) - Passion for Pacific Children

Jane is a Paediatric Oncologist who is passionate about her work in the Pacific which is part of a global issue to address the disparities in the diagnosis and care of children with cancer in the developing (low-middle income, LMIC) countries where 80% of children with cancer live. Historically, survival has been 0-20% compared to the developed world (20% of children with cancer worldwide) where survival is 80+% and consumes 80% of resources worldwide.

After graduating from the University of Auckland Medical School in 1976, Jane received her paediatric training at the former Princess Mary Hospital in Auckland. She has worked in Paediatric Oncology since 1979 and is currently one of 11 Paediatric Oncologists at the Starship Blood and Cancer Centre at Starship Children's Hospital, Auckland. Jane has sub-speciality interests in Late Effects of Childhood Cancer, Paediatric Palliative Care, Paediatric renal and hepatic tumours.

Jane's passion for her work is evident through her involvement in many organisations. She is

a member of the National Child Cancer Network (formerly Paediatric Oncology Steering Group) Late Effects, Children's Cancer Registry and Pacific Island working groups and in 2009 was appointed Chair of the Pacific Island working group. She is committed to improving the outcomes of children with cancer in the Pacific and has been visiting and working with the Pacific Health professionals in Tonga and Samoa since 2006 and, more recently, in Vanuatu. Jane is aware of the close affiliations that EGGS has in this part of the world, particularly with Tonga and Samoa and this adds an extra layer of connection to her work.

Jane is a Life Member of the New Zealand Child Cancer Foundation and until November 2018 was Board member and Convenor, Health Professional Sub-committee. She is a Member of the International Work Group Death Dying and Bereavement and was a board member from 2011-2018. She is co-author, together with Dr M Louise Webster, of the chapter "Communication with Children: their understanding, information needs and processes." in Pediatric Psych-oncology (2nd edition).

It's wonderful to know that an EGGS Old Girl is doing such vital work and, although there will be harrowing moments and tough times, it is obvious how much this work means to Jane.

Flying High - Jill Mandeno (EGGS 1955-1959)

Jill has an illustrious international career in the IT realm and received an EGGS Founders Award in 2013 for Business and Community Service. She initially worked in the UK for Rolls Royce Aerospace as a programmer and systems planner before joining ITT Europe HQ in the Technical Department, where she stayed for ten years. She then moved to the US and worked for ITT HQ's Technical Director in New York and then for the Telecommunications Group in North America. In 1968 Jill and three partners bought a computer personnel company (Key Programmers Guild), one of the earliest temporary staffing agencies in the UK. They also set up a US subsidiary to design, manufacture and market printer graphics controllers for barcoding and other industrial automatic identification systems. In 1992, with the help of now Dame Justice Judith Potter, Jill set up what is now called the EGGS Alumnae Endowment (Kathleen Mandeno) Sub-trust. This Trust manages the Kathleen Mandeno Scholarship. Trustees are Jill Mandeno, Julie Goodyer and Sally Blyth.

Despite some health setbacks this year, Jill continues to enjoy travelling, collecting wonderful artworks from around the world, not to mention many experiences and stories to share. Although she does not fly fish herself, she has been involved in the sport

for many years – it's one she came to appreciate upon meeting Roland, who hails from Sweden, has been Swedish national champ many times over and is now her partner. He loves to head to favourite NZ spots to pursue his passion, while Jill took up the sport in a different way, being President of Sport Fly Fishing NZ for 17 years (she is now its Patron) and also Chairwoman of the Commonwealth Fly Fishing Assn Inc. for 10+ years. She retired this year and is now also its Patron. Remaining firmly involved, Jill is heading to Kazakhstan in 2019 to attend an international Congress on the sport, which is aiming to join the Olympic movement in the future. We're sure Jill will return with some interesting stories to tell! With her positive outlook, philanthropic approach to life and ready availability to discuss possibilities, Jill is an inspiration in so many ways - thank you Jill!

REMEMBERING ALUMNAE

We remember with fondness all Old Girls who have passed away in recent months. You can read more obituaries on the OGA tab of the School website.

Joyce (Joy) Carter - 10th February 1921 - 11th December 2018

Joy Carter passed away peacefully in her sleep on 11th December 2018, aged 97 years. She would have been 98 on 10th February 2019. Earlier this year Joy moved out of her home in Herne Bay (in which she had lived for over 75 years) to a rest home. A group of Joy's students, including Noelene Creighton and Ro Bellamy, remained good friends and companions to Joy over the years and garden parties were often held at her home.

Joy taught Chemistry, Maths and Science at EGGS for over 30 years in the 1950s, 1960s and 1970s. She was Deputy Headmistress at EGGS from 1962 to 1973. She was a strong believer in education and was also active in the Girl Guide movement from 1941.

In the EGGS Centenary year of 2017, Alumnae and family members joined Joy for a garden party at her home to celebrate her 96th birthday the previous day; the weather was perfect for a party in her lovely garden. Later that year Joy also attended the Staff Luncheon at the Centenary celebrations; she was the oldest person present.



In 2017 Joy reluctantly stepped down from the various roles she had held in Ponsonby's U3A since

it was first established in 1994. Joy and the Ponsonby U3A were featured in an article in the Ponsonby News March 2017 edition, written by EGGS Alumna Noeline Creighton. Joy was a founder of "Greenfingers", as part of U3A. Although she continued to live independently until this year, Joy's primary carer over her later years has been her nephew, Murray Smallfield. Joy is also survived by her sister Ngawini who was one of the early gardeners at EGGS. Ngawini and Joy planted many of the original trees still found in the grounds at EGGS today.

Joy's life was celebrated at a service at All Saints Church, 284 Ponsonby Road, Ponsonby on Wednesday 19th December 2018 at 1.30pm. Lorraine Pound spoke at the funeral, and she and Fiona Cottam were both pallbearers.

Joy will be missed by many and remembered with great fondness.



Gwenda Margaret Litherland (nee Cammell) – Died 4th September 2018, aged 67

Gwenda grew up in Green Lane, attending Cornwall Park School and Remuera Intermediate before coming to EGGS in 1964 (3CG)

Her mother, Joan Cammell (nee Nicholson), also attended EGGS in the 1930s. Gwenda was cousin to OGA Committee member Margi Leech (nee Cammell) and niece of Valda Cammell (nee Nicholson). After finishing her schooling at Selwyn College, Gwenda embarked on a career in travel management, beginning at the Northern Steamship Company in the city. Gwenda married Don, an AGS Old Boy, and had three children. She studied the piano, teaching students in Mangere Bridge.

Later Gwenda continued her career. She and her husband, Don, had a very successful travel business in Royal Oak for many years; they were well-known in the travel industry and Gwenda won many awards. Gwenda died suddenly and unexpectedly in September leaving three adult children and several grandchildren. (Pictured with her granddaughter Isla). She will always be remembered as a kind and caring person, and for her community and church service.

Sally Ann Pulham (nee Hough) – Died 14th October 2018

Sally grew up in Green Lane, attending Cornwall Primary and Remuera Intermediate before coming to EGGS in 1968 (3AG). She attended Auckland Teachers College and went on to become a successful primary and intermediate teacher. Sally was a much-loved teacher and colleague, as well as a very artistic person. She was well-known for her interior design creations and for making the props for all the school performances where she taught (also where her two children, Matthew and Scarlett, attended school). Sally finished her career at Te Kura, The Correspondence School. She died at Mercy Hospice after a short illness with cancer. Her sisters are Jan Hough, 3BG 1956 (deceased) and Penny Brown, nee Hough, 3BL 1961.



Winifred Clare (Winkie) Ashby (nee Griffin) – Died 11th December 2018

Winkie attended EGGS in 1949 and was the School swimming champion. She competed at the Commonwealth Games twice (Auckland 1950, and Vancouver 1954). Winkie passed away peacefully following a brief battle with cancer. "She's off to swim in another ocean, one where the water sparkles and is always warm" – from the NZ Herald notice.

Anne Parker (nee Goodall) – Died 14th September 2018, aged 91

Anne was in 3A, 1940 and was a teacher, wordsmith and the best crossword-puzzler. She lived in Manurewa for many years. Her late sister was Judith Goodall (3AL, 1949).

Sue Mary Hamill (EGGS 1977-78) – Died 12th August 2018, aged 58

Sue (EGGS 1977/78) was a Hostel girl from Whakatane; she was in 7Cp in 1978. Sue was married to Don Richards and died in Wellington. Sue stood as an independent candidate for Ohariu in the 2014 election. Her brother is Rob Hamill, long-distance rower.

Joanne Lesley (Lesley) McHardie-Hughes – Died 20th July 2018, aged 69 years

Lesley taught at EGGS in the early 1990s and was the first Y13 Dean to do Graduation Dinner – she did five Grad Dinners between 1996 and 2016. She was a Life Member of the OGA. She died peacefully at Mercy Hospice with family by her side.

Mary Elizabeth Cresswell (nee Hill) – Died 2nd July 2018

Mary (EGGS 1957) was in 3BG. She attended the OGA 90-Year Jubilee celebrations in 2007 and won the raffle prize. Her daughters are Jane Cresswell (3WH, 1983) and Kate Akel (3CN, 1988). She died surrounded by her family.

Virginia Frances Lee (nee Neels) – Died 16th November 2018, aged 50 years.

Virginia attended EGGS in the early 1980s; she was in 3WS 1982. Virginia passed away peacefully at home in Beckenham, UK, after a long and courageous battle with cancer, with her husband Mark by her side.

Deborah Marian Knowles (nee Grossman) – Died 9th October 2018

Deborah passed away peacefully, in the presence of her family, after a long illness. Deborah attended EGGS 1964-67 (3CL 1964) and taught English and Drama at EGGS between 1979 and 1983. She was a writer and wrote a book on her family history and the Holocaust. She published five books and is survived by her husband David, children Edward and Josephine and two granddaughters.

Glen Harding (nee Nicholson) – Died 2nd October 2018

Glen attended EGGS 1937-1942 (3A 1937 and 6A 1942). She was Head Girl and Dux in 1942 and received a University Scholarship 1941/1942.

Joy Hickman – Died 27th October 2018

Joy was in 3A Modern in 1942. She was a writer of many booklets on Biblical themes, also a musician and poet. Her sister is Sheila Hickman (3A Modern 1940).

Sheila Anne McGregor (nee Snelling) – Died 5th December 2018

Sheila was a Hostel girl and was in 3B in 1945. She died peacefully in Whangarei. Her sisters were Peggy Snelling (3DM, 1947) and Cushla Traylen (nee Snelling) (3B, 1948) – both also Hostel girls, now deceased.

Nellie Gladys Chapman (nee Wakefield) – Died 1st December 2018

Nellie was in 3A (1945) and travelled from Tokoroa to EGGS for the 60-years-on Reunion in 2015 – her first visit to the School since leaving.

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
