

School Board Elections: Nominations from 15 July

It's board election time again. Next term we will be electing board members for the next three years.

Nominations will open for the election of five parent representatives to the school board no later than 15 July. NOTE: This starts during the school holidays.

The returning officer for the triennial board election is Bernardine Vester. She can be contacted at returningofficer@myschoolelection.nz.

The timetable for the election is:

Main Roll closes: Wednesday 13 July
Call for Nominations: No later than 15 July.
Supplementary Roll closes: Monday 1 August
Nominations close: Wednesday 3 August



If there are more nominations than vacancies, then parents and caregivers will receive an invitation to vote either electronically or by post.

Voting starts: Wednesday 10 August

Election day is September 7.

Voting count: Tuesday 13 September
New board in place: Wednesday 14 September.

Nominations can be made online through an email link provided in the Call for Nominations.

However, a hard copy nomination form can also be obtained from the school office.

If you wish to stand for the board, it is recommended that you provide a candidate statement and photograph.

The electoral roll will be held at the school and can be viewed during normal school hours.

ENROLMENT FOR 2023

Applications are invited for Years 9 - 13

HOME ZONE PLACES

Year 9 applicants who live in the home zone should submit their applications by 7 September 2022.

Years 10-13 applicants who live in the home zone should contact the school.

OUT OF ZONE PLACES

Applications are invited for Ballots for Out of Zone places (only students currently enrolled at other schools are eligible).

The deadline for the receipt of applications is Wednesday 7 September 2022.

This includes applications from priority applicants ie. sisters of current students, sisters of past students, daughters of past students, daughters of Board of Trustee members and employees.

Ballots for each year level will be held on Wednesday 14 September 2022.

Year 9: The Board expects to be able to offer out of zone places at Year 9 to priority groups and a limited number of general applicants, however, at this time it is unable to confirm the actual number that will be available.

Years 10, 11, 12 & 13: We will ballot for waiting lists only and any places becoming available will be filled from those lists. The Board expects to decide whether any places are available by November.

Poetry in Action

"He mana tō te tāne, he mana tō te wahine." Anei ā tātou ākonga me ō rātou pūkenga whakahirahira, ka whakanuia ka tika! "Me aro koe ki te hā o Hineahuone!"

"Men have their own mana, as do women." Here are our students and their incredible talents, which we rightly celebrate and acknowledge. "Pay heed to the strength that is woman!"

Ko Māui Hangarau

I te tekau mā ono o Pipiri ka haere ētahi kōtiro ki te Vodafone Event Centre mō te kaupapa Ko Māui Hangarau. I ako mātou tērā he mea angitu me he huarahi mahi mo mātou te hunga Rangatahi, ā, he nui ake o mātou pūmanawatanga i tā mātou i mōhio ai. I te mutunga he rangi tino pai. Ngā mihi nunui ki a Whaea Philippa Leask rātou ko Matua Vinny ko ngā kaiwhakarite katoa o tō mātou nā haerenga:

"Te manu e kai ana i te miro, nōna te ngāhere, Te manu e kai ana i te mātauranga, nōna te ao."

On the 16th of June some of our students girls went to Ko Māui Hangarau at the Vodafone Event Centre. Ko Māui Hangarau is about showing Rangatahi some of the best Māori Tech Innovators and Entrepreneurs in the country. It also encouraged us to learn about our challenges and experiences in life. The aim is to inspire Rangatahi into pathways in tech, innovation and entrepreneurship. Something we have learnt from Ko Maui Hangarau was that there are always opportunities and career pathways for young rangatahi and we have more potential than we know. Overall the day was fun and a good experience.

Ngā Whakataetae Manu Kōrero mō Te Whaitua o Uenuku



"Mōwai ana ngā nehenehe nui i te korenga o ngā manu tīoriori, o ngā tōtara haetara. Nei tētahi ara e pōī mai anō ai ngā manu, e tū ake anō ai ngā tōtara haetara. Takatū ake rā, e ngā kaiwhakahaere, kua takoto nei te mānuka, amohia ake rā!"

For those of you who are unfamiliar with Ngā Manu Kōrero it is a national speech competition with four divisions: the Pei Te Hurinui Contest or Senior Māori, for Tau 11-13 students speaking in Te Reo Māori; the Korimako Contest or Senior English for Tau 11-13 students speaking in Te Reo Pākehā; the Rāwhiti Ihaka Contest or Junior Māori for Tau 9-10 students speaking Te Reo Māori; and the Tā Turi Carroll Contest or Junior English for Tau 9-10 students speaking English. Kaihautū Māori Miriama Barton writes:

"Ngā Manu Kōrero is regarded as the most significant event on the Māori education calendar for nurturing the oratory skills and providing the stage for young people to express their views and to lay down their challenges to an admiring and critical audience of peers, parents, whānau and judges. The speech contests are intended to encourage the development of skills and confidence of Māori students in spoken English and te reo Māori. All secondary schools are invited to participate in this wonderful event, noting that the Māori section is open to all students as part of a strategy to support everyone to learn and to speak in te reo Māori."

The competition begins with several regional competitions, after schools have selected their competitors in each division. There can only be one speaker from each school in each division, although a student can speak in more than one division. Tāmaki

Makaurau has been divided into two regions for the last ten years, due to the large number of students wanting

to enter. EGGS falls into Ngā Manu Kōrero mō Te Whaitua o Uenuku (south and east Auckland), and this year's competition took place on the 23rd of June, 2022, at Te Kura Māori o Ngā Tapuwae.

This year we were represented by Ava Taiaroa (Ngāti Porou, Ngāti Tūwharetoa, Ngāti Tonga, Ngāti Pākehā) in the Korimako or Senior English section. Ava is Tau 11 and decided to speak on a topic of her own choice, which was #Land Back. Ava gave a heartfelt and moving prepared speech which moved one judge to tears and struck a chord with many of us. She did her kura, her whānau and her tūpuna proud and we look forward to hearing from her again in the future.

We'd also like to acknowledge Mihirangi Harris-Tipoki who also wanted to enter, necessitating our own mini speech comp here at the kura. We also look forward to hearing more from Mihirangi, and encourage our fluent Te Reo Māori speakers to also enter next year. Mānuka takoto, kawea ake!

Judging of the finals will be held in Wellington, without contestants present in person, on 28 – 30 September, and will be screened online. No reira rā, mātakitaki mai rā! Watch this space. He whakataetae kai te haere ka taea e tātou katoa te kite! The one advantage to the competition being online is that we can all watch, which doesn't usually happen!

Cooking a hangi is a delicate operation and artform, and even more so when it's raining. Tuesday afternoon it was looking a bit grim, but the rain stopped in time for a beautiful karakia by the fire thanks to Papa Rihari and Matua Mike Steedman (our Te Whanau Awhina Board Rep Whaea Tui Kaumoana's husband and Mia's matua whakaangi) and then a hikoi up Maungawhau followed by a hot breakfast. Everyone helped to clean up or put the kai down in the hangi - the most crucial time - while others put the finishing touches on our massive and fabulous Manawatia a Matariki sign. Then it was time to get everyone ready to serve and lift the hangi so the kai was hot and ready when everyone collected their orders.





Thank you to our kaumātua, rangatira, and tohunga Papa Richard Nahi for leading this kaupapa so beautifully and knowledgeably. Thank you Matua William Kaipo and whānau (Phoenix and Mikaya's whānau) for coming down from Whangārei – your mahi and expertise was also greatly appreciated. Thank you to Lucinda Sherratt, Sarah Brooks and Corlene Greenwood for making the most mouth-watering stuffing and fry bread and for sharing the Food Technology department and its resources and equipment with us - next year we'll put a few steamed puddings in too, hopefully! Thank you to the Kotahitanga team led so well by Matua Joel Hodgkinson and Whaea Kate Carlton. The hardest and hottest job is always on the end of the shovel handling the hot coals. This was led by Papa Richard and Matua William and ably assisted by Matua Anthony Barton, Matua Heyes Johnson (Erana's whanau) and Lyric (Whaea Corlene's son), nō reira rā, tēnā koutou katoa.



And last but by no means least – a huge thank you to all of our kohine who worked so hard all day Tuesday peeling, chopping, cleaning, and doing dishes, and then all day Wednesday digging, lifting, cleaning, and doing dishes, as well as serving and selling the hangi. We see many future rangatira, ringawera, and tohunga among you, and all of you are undoubtedly wahine toa!

"Ehara taku toa i te toa takitahi, engari taku toa he toa takitini!" - "My success doesn't come from me alone, but from working together with many others."




