Dear parents, caregivers and students

THE EDUCATION REVIEW OFFICE (ERO)

The Education Review Office (ERO) has shifted to a more developmental approach to evaluation that supports each school's improvement over time. Key features of the new approach, Te Ara Huarau, are that ERO will:

- work with all schools in an ongoing way rather than as a one-off event •
- connect with each school's strategic planning and reporting cycle as part of their improvement journey
- work in partnership with schools, collaborating in support of equitable and excellent outcomes for all learners

As a result, each school will:

- have a dedicated ERO Evaluation Partner who works alongside the school
- have a different experience depending on needs, strengths, and their school's specific evaluation focus
- be on a three-year evaluation cycle

What will public reporting on ERO's website look like?

As schools' transition into the approach, ERO will work with schools to publish a one-off Profile Report. This will focus on the strategic goals schools have in place to improve learner outcomes and what the school is seeking to achieve through the evaluation.

Within a three year cycle all schools will then have a Te Ara Huarau | School Evaluation Report. This report includes information about the school's improvement journey, what the school has achieved for learners and their future priorities.

All schools will receive a Board Assurance with Regulatory and Legislative Requirements Report about their board's attestation to meeting those requirements. Provision for International Students and Hostel Reports will be published where applicable.

Other reporting

Progress Reports - These reports are not published on ERO's website. Progress reports will provide specific information for specific audiences such as your board, the community or the Ministry of Education.

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ENROLMENT FOR 2024

Applications are invited for Years 9 - 13 HOME ZONE PLACES

Year 9 applicants who live in the home zone can submit their application at any time. Years 10-13 applicants who live in the home zone should contact the school.

OUT OF ZONE PLACES

Applications are invited for Ballots for Out of Zone places (only students currently enrolled at other schools are eligible).

The deadline for the receipt of applications is Wednesday 30 August 2023.

Available places will be allocated in the following priority order: siblings of current students, siblings of past students, children of past students, children of School Board members and employees, all other applicants.

Ballots for each year level will be held on Wednesday 6 September 2023.

Year 9: The Board will decide on the number of available places just before the ballot. This will depend on the number of applications received from students who live within the School's home zone.

Years 10, 11, 12 & 13: We will ballot for waiting lists only and any places becoming available will be filled from those lists.

World Taekwondo Tournaments

She won one gold and one bronze medal in her junior category and was the only New Zealand athlete to win a gold medal in this large-scale international tournament.

5th World Taekwondo President Cup - Gold Medal for Junior Female under 49kg. 2023 Australian Open - Bronze Medal for Junior Female under 52kg.

Athletics - European Competitions

Last term, our Sports Coordinator Bri travelled to Europe to compete in various European Athletics competitions, representing New Zealand as an exhibition athlete. Bri set PB's in the 100m hurdles and 800m, and a season's best (SB) of 1.73m in the high jump to place 9th in the Swedish senior women's heptathlon champs versus top females from all over Europe and Canada. This competition was a big highlight of Bri's as she successfully battled through a knee tweak she suffered early on in the competition.

She then did individual events in Graz, Austria, and Cologne and Rhede, both in Germany. This included her first 100m sprint in 18 months since knee surgery; 12.15s in the 100m for 5th place, as well as a SB 200m time of 24.91s.



Her final competition was in Belfast, Northern Ireland, at its Combined Events National Champs. Low numbers and swirling winds made events difficult at times but Bri managed to win all seven of her heptathlon disciplines, winning overall and securing national gold in the process. Bri bettered her 100m hurdles PB again, running 14.53s, she jumped a SB in Long Jump off a short run up and did another PB in the 800m, decreasing this time by 16s this season! Well done Bri!

Over the course of three days Charlotte competed in different events ranging from the long event on the first day where the terrain was hilly farmland with cliffs to the sprint the next day through the Blenheim CBD and the last day the relay where she was in a composite team running through the Wither Hill MTB park.

Charlotte's results included 14th in the long event, 12th in the sprint event and an unofficial result of 5th in the relay as her team was non-competitive with her individual time of 8th and she was the 2nd first leg runner back.
