BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Another very busy term draws to an end and for senior students an opportunity to re-charge the batteries before a final push towards external exams. As my daughter noted over the weekend she only has 4 weeks of high school left before her next stage in life's journey begins.

There have been a number of fund raising events this term, all in aid of raising much needed funds for the L Block re-development project. Many thanks for all involved in organising these great events, which included the 'Women in NZ Politics' discussion and an 'Evening with Helen Clark'. The next exciting event is 'Meet the Maker' scheduled for November 2nd which should be a great night and again all proceeds go towards L Block so if you haven't already please purchase your tickets through <u>iticket.co.nz</u>

The focus for the Board this term has been the visit from ERO, finalising the Masterplan and completing a review of the Strategic Plan and setting strategic goals for the next phase in the School's development.

The Masterplan is finally complete and thank you to all involved in its evolution. I say evolution because it has evolved over a period of time but I'm confident we now have a plan that identifies priorities that the school community can drive to fruition over a timeframe that each new cohort will benefit from during their time at EGGS.

The Board also spent two Saturdays deep in planning mode, firstly reviewing the current strategic goals and achievements and then formulating new goals for the future. A School's overall purpose is one of learning so obviously this needs to be the core of any goal(s). To achieve one's very best in learning the environment and the community are the foundations that need to grow and develop. These are the key strategic priorities the Board and senior management identified and clear objectives will be established to meet these needs over the coming years. Thank you to the community for all the survey feedback, both positive and constructive. It provided a great opportunity to engage the wider community and this consultation was a valued resource during the strategic review and also a useful tool for the senior leadership team. The new Strategic Plan 2019-2021 will be launched at the beginning of 2019.

The 'Tomorrow's Schools Review' task force is due to report back to the Minister in early November. This report will establish any case for change, and the recommendations will lay groundwork for more detailed policy work during 2019. The issues this task force is reviewing include:

- how well our schools are meeting the needs and aspirations of every child who walks in the gate
- how we can improve the way schools work together
- the impact of increased competition between schools
- whether enrolment schemes are working fairly
- how effectively are boards of trustees working overall
- how the performance and quality of individual schools, and the schooling system as a whole, can be better assessed.

I wish everyone an enjoyable term break and the very best to all students as you prepare for your exams next term.

Finally I would like to acknowledge the trustees for your support and the commitment of many additional hours this term. It is a pleasure to work with a trustee group so passionate about EGGS.

GENERAL NEWS Plastic at EGGS and What We Can Do

Here at EGGS, many students bring their own lunches to school or buy them from the cafeteria. The majority of the food packaging is plastic. Far too much of it. A quick walk around the grounds after lunch is testament to this. These plastics are usually from packaged foods e.g. chip packets (foil), plastic wrap, brownie and biscuit packets, and water bottles.

As students of EGGS we believe that as a school and community, we should be doing something about this problem. We should take control of how we manage our waste in our lunches.

So how can we replace this plastic?

As this problem is well-known, there are already several small solutions out there.

- Small airtight containers for chips / crackers / biscuits. These kinds of containers are reusable to use multiple times after a quick wash.
- Beeswax wraps or fabric pouches for your sandwiches. These wraps / pouches are environmentally friendly as the fabric is 100% cotton so it can biodegrade, unlike plastic.
- For food scraps, some posters will be up around the school to show where the students can dispose of their food waste.

All of these ideas are something you could do easily do at home before school.

For the parents we encourage you that you think environmentally next time you go shopping for your kids' lunches and your own lunch.

CURRICULUM NEWS Digital Exams

The Senior School Exams, held during Weeks 8 and 9, provided students with exam experience and the opportunity to gain valuable feedback. Both of these are essential as students look ahead and prepare for their NCEA exams which start on the 7th November. Students can view the full NCEA exam timetable <u>here</u>. During our school exams, many students made use of the option available to them to sit either their English and/or Classical Studies exam digitally. In total, 856 students exams were sat digitally, gaining valuable experience in preparation for their digital NCEA exams in November. We appreciate our student's willingness to test our infrastructure and provide feedback to NZQA on their digital assessment platform.



Kotahitanga

Our annual Māori Language week kicked off on Monday 10th September. This year the Kotahitanga Committee decided to create a school Korowai which represents the values and beliefs of our students here at EGGS. Students and staff were given time to decorate their feather in a way which best represents them. Over 700 feathers were coloured in and submitted to create a beautiful Korowai. We would like to thank the members of the Year 9 Māori class who put the Korowai together. The colours of the Korowai represents and acknowledges the diversity in our school. Mā pango, mā whero, ka ōti te mahi. Through collaboration, the work gets done.

On Tuesday we held the first Māori Expo. This was an opportunity to experience a number of Māori crafts such as Pio Making, Harakeke (Flax) weaving, rākau games and we also had a Kaitahi (shared kai). This event was a great success and attracted many students and staff

all eager to learn and share their talents with other members of the EGGS community.

Finally, on Friday we encouraged staff to 'Bust out their best Reo.' This linked well with the national Māori language week theme of Kia kaha te reo Māori. Many staff have been working hard to increase their use of Te reo Māori and it was a great opportunity to give it a go with their their colleagues.

To wrap up the week, the final student activity was an intense game of Dodgeball with the Juniors. Students and staff combined to take down their opposition with staff being the main target. This was a fantastic way to finish off the week.

A huge thank you to the Kotahitanga Leader, committee and the staff that supported Māori Language Week.


Eden Young Artists Awards
