# **BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

Thank you to those parents that have supported the school by way of your donation. These funds go directly towards supporting the teaching resources to allow the school to provide the full curriculum we offer currently. For those still thinking about it your contribution will be greatly appreciated.

It has been a busy start to 2019 and for the board there has been a lot of energy focused on the 'Tomorrows Schools report' and the subsequent recommendations the taskforce believe will solve all ills with the education sector. The debate has clearly created divide and this will be expressed in the many submissions that will be forwarded to the taskforce. There is a degree of protectionism, a fear of change, but also a passion within the education sector that the inequalities that have developed under the current system have created an imbalance that needs sound solutions to resolve. However the taskforce report creates a level of scepticism and ambiguity that needs to be addressed before their final submission to cabinet.

The concept of Education Hubs to take on certain governance functions and general support for schools is full of uncertainty on which the education fraternity is seeking further clarity. The costs associated with these hubs will be significant yet the funding requirements have not been determined or communicated. Further uncertainty exists in regards to where the expert resources to run these 'hubs' will come from. Our concern is that many teachers and senior school leaders will be lured away from schools therefore adding greater pressure on a profession that is desperately short of resources.

The priority, in my view, is not to create another bureaucratic level at significant cost but to re-deploy these resources into teaching salaries and professional development. Teachers are seriously underpaid and have been for a long time. The career pathways are limited, teachers are leaving the profession for financial reasons and the profession is not enticing new graduates in the numbers that are required. My message to the politicians in Wellington is to prioritise teacher salaries and pathways before rolling out an unproven change model.

The tri-annual board election process is in June this year. The board currently has 7 parent representatives, 6 of whom will be standing for re-election. The core skills that a successful board requires under the current governance model include, legal, financial, strategic, property and governance expertise. Equally as important are the skills to make sound judgement decisions, have values that align with the school and the ability to listen and contribute to the ethos to continually strive to improve on the high levels of achievement that EGGS is proud of. If you are keen to be part of the governance structure of EGGS I encourage you to firstly come along to the 'pre-election workshop' being held at EGGS which will provide a better understanding of what the role of a trustees entails. Also, nomination forms will be sent to all parents/ caregivers that are on the school role so if interested in becoming a trustee please complete this process.

By Friday 10th May	Nomination forms will be posted to all persons on the school's caregiver roll.
Friday 24th May	NOMINATIONS CLOSE – 24th May at noon. An election will be held if the number of nominations exceed vacancies. For our school, the number of vacancies is 1.
Wednesday 29th May	Voting papers will be sent by post to all on the school caregiver roll.
Friday 7th June	Voting closes at 12 noon
Thursday 13th June	Votes are counted, and our school advised of the results.
Friday 14th June	New board takes office.



I look forward to all our parent/caregivers being involved in the process.

Term 1 very quickly draws to a close. I wish the community a relaxing and reflective Easter and term break after what has been a very traumatic period in our country's history. Please look after each other and stay safe.

# **CURRICULUM NEWS Apps for Learning Languages**

Language Perfect and ImmerseMe are two exciting online resources that we use regularly in our language classes and for which you will find annual subscription charges on your daughter's EGGS account. We request that you pay these as soon as is possible.

# EducationPerfect

(Language Perfect). We have been using this excellent programme for eight or nine years now. Our students tell us that they love learning their vocabulary and grammar using this programme, which has been found to increase retention over time. The annual subscription for Year 9, 10 and 11 students of Chinese, French, Japanese, Maori and Spanish is \$30.00. For Latin students it is \$20.00 (due to fewer resources). As we were inaugural users, by the time your daughter reaches Years 12 and 13, there will be no charge. Note that there is only one annual charge no matter how many languages your daughter learns but there is a separate charge for Maths and Science classes.

## Immersel

is a virtual reality (VR) language learning programme which we use to promote spontaneous communication in the target language. Our students tell us in annual surveys that speaking with others is their goal when language learning. This programme allows students to converse with native speakers in a fun and realistic VR environment. Again, as we were involved in the development of this programme, we have a reduced annual subscription of \$20.00 per student. At this stage, if your daughter is in Year 9, 10, 11 or 12 French, Year 10 or 11 Chinese, or Year 9, 10 or 11 Spanish, you will be charged for this app. Others will not be charged.

Please ask your daughter to show you how these programmes are helping her learn language. We hope you will be impressed.

#### Founders Award presented to Ro Bellamy

On Monday 25th March 2019 Rosemary (Ro) Bellamy (née Colgan) was honoured as an EGGS Founder, for "Outstanding Service to the Old Girls Association and Epsom Girls Grammar School". Ro is battling ill health, so we presented her with the award at a private ceremony in advance of the usual Founders Assembly in held in June. We are very proud to honour Ro in this way and offer our congratulations and best wishes. Here's an abridged version of Ro's Citation.

Ro, who attended EGGS as a student between 1954 and 1958, has taught at EGGS for many years over three stints (1963-1965, 1968-1972 and 1982-2001). She has served on the OGA Committee for 37 years and was President from 2007 to 2010. In addition, Ro served on the Board of Trustees when it was first established under Tomorrow's Schools.

Education and sport have always been Ro's principal focus. She spent time in New York and after finishing her teaching role at EGGS she went on to do post-graduate study at the University of Auckland with a Royal Society (NZ) Teaching Fellowship followed by completing an MSc and continuing her love of teaching by working at the University.

Ro has always been proud to say that she came to EGGS in 1954 and has never quite left. She has spent a huge chunk of her life involved in the school, one way or another, particularly in relation to the gardens. Ro has spent years caring for the School gardens, volunteering her time to weed and water plants over the weekends and holidays, planting and nurturing memorial trees donated in memory of Old Girls, helping to re-establish the native trees along the Manukau Road boundary and caring for the flax bushes from the property of Sir Apirana Ngata behind the Gae Griffiths Library. Green spaces, quadrangles and Paradise have all benefited from her caring touch over the years as she has strived to keep alive the vision that both Marjory Adams and Joy Carter had for the school grounds, namely that they should be mainly grass and trees, for ease of maintenance.



Not only has Ro been an active gardener at EGGS, she has passed her skills on to countless students over the years by organising gardening clubs and working bees in the gardens to encourage students to care for the school grounds and learn the joy of gardening.

For the Centenary weekend, Ro and her husband Dick bought bags of daffodil bulbs and offered returning Old Girls the chance to donate to the School by planting a bulb under the trees opposite the Administration Building. These now bloom each spring, fulfilling Ro's vision for a "host of golden daffodils" to grace the entrance area.

Along with her legacy of garden maintenance and enhancement over past years, and into the future, and her long teaching career, Ro has also been a generous and much appreciated donor to the School and OGA in so many other ways.

It is a great pleasure to honour Ro as a distinguished alumna of Epsom Girls Grammar School and a recipient of a Founders Award in 2019 for her outstanding service to the Old Girls Association and Epsom Girls Grammar School.

## **Women in Law Function**

On Wednesday 27 March EGGS alumnae, parents, and current students were treated to an informative and entertaining panel discussion on what lawyers in different types of legal practise do. Our panellists included alumnae Belinda Sellars Q.C., senior criminal barrister at Freyberg Chambers; Kavita Deobhakta, litigation partner at Morgan Coakle who specialises in insurance litigation; Yasmin Olsen, criminal prosecutor at Kayes Fletcher Walker; and Tara Hauraki, a solicitor at Kahui Legal, who provides specialist legal services to iwi and Māori organisations. Dame Judith Potter DNZM CBE, also a former student, facilitated the panel.



The panel covered the broad range of experiences that have led them to their successful careers in the law, and gave insights to the audience about the breadth of pathways a career in the law can offer. The session was particularly useful for the younger members of the audience (including senior EGGS students and current law school students), who received a number of useful career planning tips – including about grabbing opportunities as they arise – and insight on where a law degree can take you. Panellists and attendees had an opportunity to connect with peers and colleagues after the panel concluded.
